#### **Remembering Eisenhower's Farewell Address**

January 13<sup>:</sup> January 17, 2011 will be the 50th anniversary of President Eisenhower's Farewell Address to the nation in which he warned of the dangers of the unwarranted influence of the military-industrial complex. Eisenhower believed that the only way to assure that the military-industrial complex can be meshed "with our peaceful methods and goals" is through "an alert and knowledgeable citizenry." "Together we must learn how to compose differences, not with arms, but with intellect and decent purpose. Because this need is so sharp and apparent, I confess that I lay down my official responsibilities in this field with a definite sense of disappointment." The US arsenal increased under his watch from approximately 1,400 in 1953 to over 20,000 in 1960. I suspect that he would be even more disappointed today.

January, 10 - On November 17-18, 2010, People's Solidarity for Participatory Democracy and the Center of Peace and Law of the Institute of Legal Studies of Inha University, in partnership with the Pacific Freeze, Peace Network and Civil Peace Forum, organized an international workshop as part of the Asia-Pacific Freeze Campaign, aimed at reducing military spending in a region characterized by remnant Cold War tensions and a constant arms race. John Feffer from IPS called for "a coordinated freeze and then reduction in military spending among the countries that were involved in the Six Party Talks." Colin Archer from IPB encouraged participants to participate in the Global Day of Action on Military Spending, to be held on April 12, 2011.

December 26 - US has emerged as the biggest supplier of major conventional weapons to the Gulf countries between 2005 and 2009, according to a recent research published by the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI).."The volume of arms imported by the UAE has increased significantly in the past decade and the country is likely to remain a major arms importer in the coming years," researchers Carina Solmirano and Pieter Wezeman said in their paper titled 'Military spending and arms procurement in the Gulf states'.

#### Sounds of Summer: Deadly legacy of US cluster bombs in Loas

January 11 - From 1964 and 1973, the US dropped 260 million cluster sub-munitions on Laos in a covert mission to destroy North Vietnamese supply lines. 80 million unexploded bombs were scattered across the Laos countryside. The bombs have killed or maimed more than 20,000 people since the war ended..This year, Australia signed a new international treaty banning the use of cluster bombs. Mr Lamlany, Lao survivor: "..Please stop. It is very dangerous. I know that because I have been disabled for more than 30 years. I don't want another generation to face the same problem. We cannot change the past but we can change the future."

#### LAOS: Female Deminers Attract Fans but Little Funding

January 4 – In the two years since the Laos government set up the first team of women clearing unexploded ordnance (UXO), they have had lots of attention, but this has not translated into increased funding, says the UN, which is supporting government programmes. "It was quite in vogue with donors to have all-female teams," said John Dingley, the UN's senior technical adviser working with the government's UXO Lao clearance programme. "But more than that, these are good jobs and we want to create as many opportunities as possible for women in post-conflict settings."

#### S.Korea: Jeju Island Continues to Protest Against the Construction of a Naval Base

Protests continue on Jeju Island, South Korea - also known in the region as the peace island - where the US and South Korean government's plan to build a navy base. This winter as construction begins, neither snow, wind or a below-zero temperature have discouraged villagers of Gangjeong from protesting against the construction of the naval base, which threatens to bring more conflict in the region, as well as destroy soft coral habitats listed by the UNESCO as world heritage environmental sites, and disrupt fishing and the way of life of the people of Jeju Island.
