UK MPs press government for clarity on Trident spending

MPs called for clarity on spending on Britain's Trident replacement programme and on the process through which this spending is approved. But the Minister responding to the Westminster Hall debate provided few answers beyond repeating decades-old justifications for retention of the Cold War system. Peter Luff MP, Minister for Defence Equipment, Support and Technology attempted to minimise the scale of the money that will be committed ahead of the main investment decision ('Main Gate'), due to be made in 2016.

New budget for Myanmar gives nearly 24 per cent to defence, 1.3 per cent to health

March 1 - Nearly one-quarter of Myanmar's new national budget will go to defence, an official publication reported Tuesday, following an election that was supposed to hand power to a civilian government after decades of military rule. A newly elected parliament met in January for the first time in two decades but apparently was not given oversight of the budget: The document was enacted before the legislature sat on Jan. 31, according to the Government Gazette. The gazette reported that 23.6 per cent of the budget this year, will go to defence. The health sector, meanwhile, will get 1.3 per cent. Myanmar has the 44th highest infant mortality rate of the 193 countries listed by the UNICEF in its 2011 State of the World's Children report.

Thriving arms industry

February 27 - Global arms sales reached new heights, according to a recent report by a think tank in Sweden. Despite the global recession, the sales, both domestic and exports, of the world's most profitable arms-producing companies increased by nearly \$15 billion from 2008 to 2009, reaching a total \$400 billion in arms sales throughout the world — the highest amount ever. Other estimates put that figure as high as \$1 trillion. The report from Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) shows that the arms industry is thriving despite the ongoing global economic recession. American company Lockheed Martin took first place with \$33.4 billion in arms sales, followed by British BAE Systems at \$33.3 billion. Even as the recession hangs on in every country, more and more is still spent on the military.

U.S., European Weapons Makers Still Dominate Arms Bazaar

March 3 - UN, Mar 3, 2011 (IPS) - The world's key arms manufacturers are still firmly entrenched in the United States and Western Europe, while some of the newly-emerging military industries in China, India, Japan, Singapore, South Korea, Israel, Turkey and Kuwait are trailing mostly far behind. A new study released by the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) points out that only 10 of the world's 100 largest arms manufacturers are now based in Asia and the Middle East, with none in Latin America or Africa..

March 6 - High above the Pacific en route to Beijing in January, Robert Gates let slip he was travelling to China bearing gifts — not for the country's rulers but for US commanders in the region. Mr Gates' staff soon fleshed out details of the plans — a new nuclear-capable bomber able to reach east Asia from the US, modernised radar for the F-15 fighter jet, a launch vehicle for sending satellites into space, and seaborne drone aircraft — aimed at countering China's own military advances. All this forms part of President Barack Obama's defence spending plans.

China says it will boost its defence budget in 2011

March 4 - China is to increase its defence budget in 2011, amid fears in the region that its

military might is growing. Spending will increase by 12.7% to 601.1bn yuan (\$91.5bn; £56.2bn) up from 532.1bn yuan last year, officials said. Many analysts say China's actual spending on defence is far higher than the government reports. The announcement comes a day ahead of the annual National People's Congress, at which the Communist Party outlines its five-year plan. China has been building up its military in recent years; the defence budget was increased by 7.5% in 2010.. Chinese parliamentary spokesman Li Zhaoxing said the increase was justified, and China posed no threat to anyone.

On 22nd February 2011 Gaddafi accused Italy of arming civilians against him; he was probably the victim of a delusion, since he himself is massacring civilians thanks to Italian weapons. In 2008 the Treaty of Friendship, Partnership and Cooperation signed between Italy and Libya normalized the unstable bilateral relationship between the two countries which started with the Italian colonization of Libya in 1911. The following IPB article analyses the links between this agreement and the arms trade from Italy to Libya. A total of €93 million of Italian weapons were exported to the Colonel from 2008, rising to almost €112 million in 2009.

These rebellions brought hope to millions and youthful energy to societies suffering decades of repression, injustice, inequality, especially gender inequality, and increasing economic hardship. The Libyan revolt was inspired by these largely nonviolent victories, but, as the world has witnessed with dismay, has rapidly become militarized and is now embroiled in a full-scale civil war.

Defence and security budgets remain shrouded in secrecy, while ever-shrinking resource envelopes are allocated for national investment in poverty-reduction strategies, infrastructure, and social programming..."

Anti-arms activists to petition 10 Downing Street "This is NOT OK" From CAAT

On Wednesday 9 March, anti-arms trade campaigners called on the Prime Minister to end government support for arms sales and for the DSEi arms fair, scheduled to be held in London in September 2011. The action reflects widespread public revulsion at UK arms sales to despotic regimes in the Middle East and North Africa who have used UK weaponry against peaceful protesters. A recent YouGov poll for the Sunday Times showed that 76% of the British public thought it was wrong to sell arms to Libya. The petition is part of Campaign Against Arms Trade's campaign "This is NOT OK" that highlights the government's promotion of arms sales to repressive regimes and countries in conflict.

Colombian women: "We Denounce the Militarisation of Our Lives"

Behrous Amiri, IPS interviews Patricia Guerrero of the Displaced Women's League March 3 – Paramilitary groups in Colombia continue to threaten, harass and violently attack women's rights activists, says Patricia Guerrero, founder of a leading human rights group. Behrous Amiri spoke with Guerrero, who helped found the "City of Women" outside Cartagena in 2003, a space where women displaced by the fighting could evolve from victims to agents of change. Altogether, some 5.2 million people were forced to flee rural areas of this South American country between 1985 and 2010, according to a report released in February by the Consultancy on Human Rights and Displacement.

Arm Sales, Especially by Russia and China, Continue to Penetrate Latin America

March 2 - Russian military sales have become so frequent in recent years that they no longer make for major headlines. However, as Washington policymakers continue to voice concern about Iran's growing influence in Latin America, some alarmists argue that Russia's eagerness to supply the region with weapons is likely to trigger a "soft arms race" and present itself as a threat to the United State's historic hegemony in the Western Hemisphere. Adherents to this point of view persist in looking at Moscow through a nostalgic Cold War lens that sees Russia (and probably China) as a growing and certain threat to U.S. national security. Little, if anything is heard of Washington concerns about other countries (like Israel or France) selling weaponry to the region..

Guns, war and the domestic battlefield

March 8 - The Small Arms Survey estimates there are currently around 900 million such weapons in circulation worldwide and that they cause around half a million deaths annually. These arms are produced by more than a thousand manufacturing companies located in nearly a hundred countries. Recorded world trade in SALW, including parts and ammunition, hovers at around \$300 billion a year. The USA is by far the biggest single exporting country, with more than three times the figure of its nearest competitor, Germany. Only a quarter of small arms and light weapons are thought to be in the armories of state security sectors, the remainder are in the hands of non-state militias or civilians. Three-fifths of the deaths they cause occur in armed conflict, while two-fifths take place far from the battlefield ..

How much can we justify spending on nuclear weapons?

March 14 - Is it not time to talk realistically about the \$200 billion or more we plan to spend over the next decade on strategic nuclear weapons and their land- and sea-based delivery systems? The threat of radioactive gases being released in the air from the Fukushima Daiichi unit 1 reactor caused the evacuation of everyone within the surrounding 12.5-mile area. This threat would seem minor in the face of what would be generated by an explosion in the area of a 100-kiloton nuclear warhead, which is the equivalent of 100,000 tons of TNT. The bomb dropped on Hiroshima was 12.5 kilotons..

Jacqueline Cabasso, executive director of the Western States Legal Foundation told IPS that members of the coalition agreed that the longstanding doctrine must be discredited and replaced with an urgent commitment to achieve global nuclear disarmament. "Before another nuclear weapon is used, nuclear deterrence must be replaced by humane, legal and normal security strategies," she said..

Candidate Obama has begun preparations for the 2012 elections. Eighty percent of Democrats and sixty percent overall do not believe the war is worth fighting. Those who helped elect the President must let him know, "Without a shift in your policy, it is hard to imagine the same kind of movement will develop to support your re-election campaign".

March 2 - The collapse of the Soviet Union left the Russian Federation with the majority of the ailing defense industry. By 1991, 70-80% of the Soviet defence industry was based on Russian soil. However, key aspects of the Soviet Union's integrated defence system became unavailable to Russia. Missile early warning systems and air-defence capabilities had been sited outside Russian borders..The sheer size of the military-industrial complex meant that Russia was saddled with an inefficient behemoth, with some 9mn employees working in up to 1,500 state-owned research, design and production facilities. The challenge for the government has been to privatize as much of the industry as possible, while retaining control over the more sensitive, high-technology sectors..

A SAVING REMNANT: The Radical Lives of Barbara Deming and David McReynolds (former IPB Vice-President)

Martin Duberman, known as "the father of gay studies," is a distinguished historian, playwright, essayist, novelist, and public intellectual, and any new book by him is an event in queer culture to which attention must be paid. David McReynolds was a staff member of the War Resisters League from the late 1950s to 1999 and is a major figure in the US antiwar movement. He was an IPB Vice-President from 1983-89 and since then has remained as a Consultant. Barbara Deming, from a rather different background, was also a writer and a key member of the US nonviolent movement. This double biography focuses on their gay identities, but as McReynolds says: "It belongs in the broader history of part of the American radical movement in the last century".

Yearbook on Peace Processes

This sixth edition of the **Yearbook of Peace Processes** analyses conflicts in which negotiations are being held to reach a peace agreement, regardless of whether these negotiations are formalised, are in the exploratory phase, are faring well or, to the contrary, are stalled or in the midst of crisis. It also analyses some cases in which negotiations or explorations are partial; that is, they do not include all the armed groups present in the country (such as the case of India, for example). The majority of the negotiations refer to armed conflicts, but we also analyse quite a few contexts in which, despite the fact that there are no considerable armed clashes today, the parties have not reached a permanent agreement that would put an end to the hostilities and conflicts still pending. In that sense, the negotiations make sense in an effort to fend off the start or resurgence of new armed clashes.
