IPB NOBEL CENTENARY YEAR-SPECIAL EVENTS PLANNED!

This year IPB celebrates a very special year: it is 100 years since the organisation was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for its efforts in promoting peace, and for coordinating the work of national peace societies. In 2010 we are organising various events to commemorate this important milestone in the history of the organised peace movement. These activities culminate in a major international conference plus the triennial IPB Assembly and other activities, in Oslo from 23-26 Sept. IPB invites all members and supporters to join together for this great celebration in the Norwegian capital. Under the broad title 'A Climate for Peace' we will organise – together with the Norwegian Peace Council - an intensive programme of discussions, social gatherings and cultural events. Before that, from June 6th to late July, IPB's photo-exhibition 'Making Peace' will be shown along Lake Geneva in front of the office of the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights. There will also be a 'Peace Village' on June 6th and Garden Party. In addition, we have written to all our members to invite them to organise activities and events in their own areas, as part of the Centenary programme.

IPB'S DISARMAMENT FOR DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

In 2005 IPB launched a major new programme, designed to reflect widespread public concern at the rapid rise in global military spending (totalling \$1464 billion in 2008); and the evidence that weapons – such as small arms, cluster bombs, landmines – seriously impede sustainable development. Post 9-11, the failure of military solutions should be obvious to all. IPB advocates reductions in defence budgets and the adoption of a 'human security' approach. Activities organised in pursuit of these goals include: seminars, publications, website, e-newsletter, exhibitions and a media programme. National and international networks are gradually being developed.

The long-awaited Nuclear Posture Review released today by President Obama is the most important and thorough re-evaluation of US nuclear policy since the Cold War. While it is not a blueprint for rapid nuclear disarmament, it marks the first time the US has made the elimination of nuclear weapons a guiding principle, focusing more on reducing the dangers of nuclear weapons than on finding roles and rationales for them. This is a very welcome and long overdue course correction.

April, 8th U.S. LOOKS TO NONNUCLEAR WEAPONS TO USE AS DETERRENT

As the White House pushes for cuts in the U.S. nuclear arsenal, the Pentagon is developing a weapon to help fill the gap: missiles armed with conventional warheads that could strike anywhere in the world in less than an hour. U.S. military officials say the intercontinental ballistic missiles, known as Prompt Global Strike weapons, are a necessary new form of deterrence against terrorist networks and other adversaries. As envisioned, the conventional missiles would give the White House a fresh military option to consider in a crisis that would not result in a radioactive mushroom cloud.

"The administration has asked Congress for \$240 million for next year's Prompt Global Strike development programs, a 45 percent increase from the current budget."

Peace Boat's Global Voyage will be setting sail from the port of Yokohama on April 16 (Fri) on the third Global Voyage for a Nuclear-Free World, in which ten Hibakusha will (atomic bomb survivors) will participate. During the 101 day journey until July 25, they will be visiting 22 ports in 20 countries, giving testimonies of their experiences. This year, 65 years since the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, much is taking place around the world with the potential to greatly affect the future of nuclear weapons abolition – including the recent signing of the new US-Russia disarmament treaty, and the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) Review Conference in May. With only limited time left for the Hibakusha to directly share their experiences, it is now urgent to spread the messages from Hiroshima and Nagasaki to the world.

Spring 2010 HOW GOVERNMENTS SHOULD COMPENSATE FOR DEFENCE SPENDING CUTS BY DICK ZANDEE

Many European governments cut their defence budgets last year, intensifying fears that the EU's military outreach, and thus the goals of the Common Security and Defence Policy (CSDP), will be seriously weakened. The European Defence Agency's Dick Zandee puts his case for a European approach to defence cooperation. At first it was called a "peace dividend", but now it's seen as a very real problem. In the years following the end of the Cold War, European defence budgets shrunk alarmingly. Only in recent years have they begun to stabilise, with some national defence budgets even showing small increases as the result of political support for military campaigns in the Balkans, Africa and in the Middle East.
