## IPB ANNUAL CONFERENCE- WASHINGTON, D.C, NOV 13-15, 2009

As the new U.S. administration has revived the hope of peace activists inside and outside the USA, this conference will be a great opportunity to intensify partnerships, share views and lobby decision makers on the theme: Rolling back militarism: a task for the global movement. ## DISARMAMENT FOR DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

In 2005 IPB launched a major new programme, designed to reflect widespread public concern at the rapid rise in global military spending (totalling \$1339 billion in 2007); and the evidence that weapons -- such as small arms, cluster bombs, landmines -- seriously impede sustainable development. Post 9-11, the failure of military solutions should be obvious to all. IPB advocates reductions in defence budgets and the adoption of a 'human security' approach. Activities organised in pursuit of these goals include: seminars, publications, website, e-newsletter, exhibitions and a media programme. National and international networks are gradually being developed.

# Gaza Conflict: US Arms and the EU-Israel Agreement

On February 23, Amnesty International released a report stating that Israel made extensive use of US-made weapons in its recent assault on Gaza including 500lb bombs, hellfire missiles, and white phosphorus artillery shells. On March 31, the <u>Peace Cycle</u> will cycle from the International Courts of Justice in the Hague to the European Parliament in Brussels, to hand-deliver a petition to suspend the EU-Israel Association Agreement which governs trade and other ties between the EU and Israel.

A Case for Economic Conversion in Social Movement Organization

Drawing on works by Dan Clawson and Noam Chomsky, anti-war activist Milan Rai offers reflections on social movement organization and tactics. Rai argues that if the peace movement is going to succeed, it will have to cooperate with and learn from radical trade unions and labour groups. Radicalism, Rai states, doesn't mean risking physical injury or getting arrested. Rather, it is about developing actions that can contribute to uprooting militarism, war, and corporate power and creating organizations that have deep roots in communities. ## **Obama's budget requests 4% increase in base funding**

President Obama's budget outline requests a 4 percent increase in basic military spending, from \$513 billion to \$534 billion. This does not include the additional \$205 billion requested to fund the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan through the end of fiscal 2010. The administration has stated that it intends to shift money from some of the larger "cold war-style" weapons to smaller programs focussed on cyber security and insurgents in Iraq and Afghanistan. The steady increase of military spending witnessed during President George W. Bush's terms is becoming increasingly unviable, according to leading political leaders and policy analysts in the United States. ## **Obama Admin Seeks to Reduce US & Russian Nuclear Stockpiles**

The Obama administration is gearing up for early negotiations with Russia on a new treaty that would sharply reduce stockpiles of nuclear warheads. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton has notified Congress and her staff that she intends to get started quickly on talks with the Russians, who have voiced interest in recent weeks in settling on a new treaty calling for cutbacks in arsenals on both sides. The 1991 Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty expires at the end of the year. It limited the United States and Russia to 6,000 nuclear warheads each. <u>Read full article</u>.

## Most Conflicts Occur in Areas of Greatest Biodiversity

In a recent study published by *Conservation Biology*, it was revealed that more than 80% of the world's major armed conflicts occurred in regions that contained the most biologically diverse plant and animal life on earth. The study, which examined those conflicts which resulted in more than 1,000 deaths between 1950-2000, pointed to the negative effects of conflict on the environment. ## **Costa Rica to Ban Uranium Weapons**

On March 4<sup>th</sup>, a member of Costa Rica's legislative assembly released a draft for a comprehensive ban on uranium weapons. It is anticipated that the ban text will be written into a 1995 law controlling explosive weapons. If passed, the text will ban the sale, use, transit, production, and distribution of Uranium weapons in Costa Rica. <u>Read more</u>.
