## Disarmament for Development programme

In 2005 IPB launched a major new programme, designed to reflect widespread public concern at the rapid rise in global military spending (now totalling \$1204 billion); and the evidence that weapons -- such as small arms, cluster bombs, landmines -- seriously impede sustainable development. Post 9-11, the failure of military solutions should be obvious to all. IPB advocates reductions in defence budgets and the adoption of a 'human security' approach. Activities organised in pursuit of these goals include: seminars, publications, website, e-newsletter, exhibitions and a short film. National and international networks are gradually being developed.

## Twin campaigns to move the world towards peace and social justice

In his new essay, our Secretary-General Colin Archer links the "pacifist" article 9 of the Japanese Constitution and article 26 of UN Charter that requires Security Council to "formulate plans for a system for the regulation of armaments"... "In order to promote the establishment and maintenance of international peace and security with the least diversion for armaments of the world's human and economic resources." Showing the potential power of art. 9 and its significance in a Disarmament for Development perspective (art. 26), he stresses the need for coordination of international civil society efforts in this field. ## Contaminated countries embrace ban on cluster munitions

A conference of states affected by cluster munitions was held on October 3rd and 4th in Belgrade to ensure that the expectations of those who have suffered the most are central to the new international treaty to be negotiated banning these weapons. Initiated by Serbia, this conference is part of the Oslo process started in February with the aim of concluding a treaty to ban cluster munitions by 2008. 80 countries are currently taking part. #### Yemen: Moves afoot to reduce number of firearms in cities

Following a decision of Interior Ministry in August, the carrying of arms has been banned in the capital and in provincial capitals as a reaction to the high level of killings and injuries caused by guns. Officials already speak about a decrease in the number of incidents, although further efforts are needed. # Two citizens' initiatives in Switzerland: for prohibition of arms exports and for protection from weapons kept in the home

The first initiative aims to forbid the exports of arms and related goods - in order to make the Swiss humanitarian position more credible and to show its commitment to peace and disarmament. It was submitted on September 21st (Intl. Day of Peace) to the federal authorities along with 109 000 signatures. Swiss voters will have to vote on it later on. IPB member organisation Women for Peace is supporting this initiative.

The objective of the second initiative that has just been opened for signatures is to establish a stricter control over firearms and to reduce the number of homes containing weapons. IPB member organisations <a href="Centre for Non-violent Action">Centre for Non-violent Action</a>, the <a href="Swiss Peace Council">Swiss Peace Council</a>, <a href="Women for Peace">Women for Peace</a> and <a href="Pax">Pax</a> Christi are supporting this initiative.

The popular initiative is one of the two pillars of Swiss direct democracy, allowing citizens to modify the Federal Constitution. If 100 000 signatures can be collected for a particular initiative, a nationwide vote will be organised.

## Italian Mayors for peace: making Italy a nuclear weapon free zone

An initiative lauched by two Italian mayors and a large coalition of NGOs wants to make Italy a nuclear weapon free zone. This is very significant as the two mayors are from the cities where US nuclear weapons are held. The objective is to collect 50 000 signatures so the initiative can be discussed in Italian parliament. Various activities and manifestations have already been
