1. Resolution on Global Governance Reform in a Shifting Geopolitical Landscape

Presented to and approved by the Triennial Assembly, 25–26 October 2025

Fundamental changes in international constellations require new international governance. The challenges of the world today, from conflict prevention and resolution to action on the climate emergency, have revealed fundamental flaws in the UN structure that prevent meaningful action for the world's peoples. The current weaknesses of the UN system presents us with the challenge of strengthening and further developing it in order to solve global challenges. At the same time, the UN faces threats from forces who seek to undermine multilateralism.

At a moment when these weaknesses can no longer be ignored and the legitimacy of international law and institutions grows fragile, there is an urgent need for reform. The objective is to democratise the UN and its associated international organisations by actively involving new regional and international networks (e.g. BRICS plus) and significantly expanding the influence of civil society.

The vision remains: a different world of social justice and peace is possible.

IPB Staff, Board, Council members and affiliates commit to:

- Educate and advocate for the urgency of global governance reform, including the contents of the Pact for the Future; supporting efforts to internationalise UNHQ and meetings, and joining efforts for greater inclusion of civil society and regional networks within the UN framework;
- Oppose efforts to weaken or delegitimise the UN; including developing partnerships, coalitions, and networks working around global governance reform;
- Manifest support for U.N. peacemaking efforts and international institutions and treaties, including the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons, the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, the International Criminal Court, and the International Court of Justice.
